Singapore Cooperation Programme

Singapore has provided technical assistance to other developing countries since the 1960s. As a country whose only resource is its people, Singapore believes that human resource development is vital for economic and social progress. Singapore itself has benefited from training provided by other countries and international organisations.

In 1992, the Singapore Cooperation Programme (SCP) was established to bring together under one framework the various technical assistance programmes offered by Singapore. Through the SCP, the range and number of training programmes were increased to share Singapore's development experience with other developing countries. To date, Singapore has sponsored training courses and study visits for over 90,000 officials from more than 170 countries. The SCP is managed by the Technical Cooperation Directorate of the Singapore Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Nanyang Technological University-Centre for Continuing Education, Singapore

Course Objectives

The Singapore healthcare approach is often applauded for its performance, and how Singapore managed to achieve such performance is by placing the emphasis on personal responsibility and prudence both on the individual and public levels. This programme aims to provide senior government officials and health care sector and personnel a better understanding and in depth knowledge on the policies, regulatory frameworks for the integrated development and management of public health care, chronic disease management and infrastructure facilities systems in Singapore.

By the end of the programme, participants should be able to:

- Understand the basic concepts of Singapore's integrated healthcare plans, policies and road map
- Gain insights into the policy frameworks adopted by the Singapore Government towards institutionalising sound practices of public healthcare systems in the public and private sectors
- Better appreciate the importance of financing and insurance frameworks, the insurance plans
- Achieve an overall understanding of the various types of efficient healthcare plans, and the related principles and application issues
- Acquire first-hand knowledge of healthcare planning and treatment measures as well as hospital administration and management through conducted tours of hospital facilities and research labs

Synopsis and Methodology

The topics to be covered over the 5-day programme would involve the following topics related to public healthcare planning and management in Singapore:

 Healthcare management frameworks. The frameworks and approaches will be discussed which would include the goals of the Singapore Healthcare Road Map, the 3Ms framework – Medisave, Medishield and Medifund. The topic will cover the roles and functions of Central Provident Fund schemes, the coming Medishield Life and private insurance medical schemes

- Financing and insurance frameworks. This will cover how healthcare is funded in Singapore via individual (self), individual (insurance), employer (insurance) and government taxes
- Insurance plans. In this topic, the different insurance plans will be discussed in details including Medishield, the basic health insurance scheme, and the ongoing review of Medishield Life, Eldershield
- Regulations and legislation on healthcare, infrastructure facilities and delivery systems, including primary healthcare, secondary healthcare and tertiary healthcare, the move towards vertically integrated regional healthcare networks, as well as the leveraging of collaboration/partnerships with public, private and community sectors
- Managing chronic diseases including the polyclinic services for primary acute/chronic outpatient care
- Managing an ageing society including Eldershield, long term care insurance, Medifund

The programme would comprise the delivery of a systematic curriculum and relevant course materials that would be used for interactive discussions in the classroom using a combination of the following methodologies:

- i) Lessons would be interactive and experiential
- ii) Formal lectures will be conducted by experienced medical practitioners, hospital administration experts, university professors as well as policy makers
- iii) Group discussions, case studies and sharing of best practices
- iv) Site visits to relevant hospitals and health promotion board

Duration

The course will be held from 31 August to 4 September 2015.

Application Information

Applicants should be:

- Mid to senior level officials from foreign government agencies involved in public healthcare sector administration and planning, with relevant experience in financial and budget management
- Nominated by their respective Governments
- · Proficient in spoken and written English
- In good health

Terms of Award

The course is sponsored by the Government of Singapore under the Singapore Cooperation Programme Training Award and the Small Island Developing States Technical Cooperation Programme.

Under this programme arrangement, the Government of Singapore will bear the following expenses for the successful applicants (thereafter known as participants) during their training in Singapore. These expenses include:

- A daily training allowance of One Hundred and Twenty Singapore Dollars (S\$120) from first day to last day of the course to cover meals and daily expenses. [Complimentary breakfast is provided in the hotel from the first day to one day after the course.];
- Transportation to course venue and site visits;
- Medical insurance for participants to cover accident and hospitalisation during their stay in Singapore in accordance with the policy of a local insurance company; and
- Accommodation for the entire duration of the course.

Note:

- The nominating government will be responsible for their participants' round-trip airfares
- (ii) Participants are to bear their personal miscellaneous expenses that might be incurred prior to receiving the allowance
- (iii) Any expenses for out-patient medical/dental treatment will be borne by the participants themselves

Regulations

Participants are required to comply with the following:

- (a) Strictly observe course schedules and not miss training sessions;
- (b) Not bring any member of their family and/or aide for the duration of the course;
- (c) Carry out instructions and abide by conditions as may be stipulated by the nominating Government or the Government of Singapore with respect to the course;
- (d) Refrain from engaging in political activities, or any form of employment for profit or gain while in Singapore;
- (e) Discontinue the course, in the event they fall seriously ill and are considered unable to continue the training or have committed an improper act; and
- (f) Return to their respective home countries upon completion of the course.

Application Procedure

(Closing date for nomination: 20 July 2015)

The Government of Singapore is pleased to invite the respective National Focal Points for Technical Assistance to nominate <u>one (1)</u> suitable applicant.

Selection of candidates will be based on merit. Should there be more applicants than training places, the Government of Singapore seeks the understanding of the respective National Focal Points for Technical Assistance in the event that its nominee(s) is not selected.

All nominations are to be submitted by the respective Government Institutions, using the official application form. The application forms are to be submitted and should reach the **Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Singapore** through the National Focal Point and the Singapore Embassy in the nominating country not later than **Monday**, 20 July 2015.
