

ABOUT MALAYSIAN TECHNICAL COOPERATION PROGRAMME (MTCP)

MTCP was first initiated at the First Commonwealth Heads of Government Regional Meeting (CHOGRM) in Sydney in February 1978. MTCP was officially launched on 7 September 1980 at the 2nd CHOGRM in New Delhi, India.

Annually, more than 100 MTCP Programmes are offered by more than 79 MTCP Training Institutions, many which are centres of excellence for training. Since its inception, MTCP has gained more than 30,600 participants from 142 countries.

OBJECTIVES OF MTCP

- To share development experience with other Countries;
- To strengthen bilateral relations between Malaysia and other developing countries;
- To promote South-south Cooperation (SSC); and
- To promote technical cooperation among developing countries (TCDC).

ABOUT MERCY MALAYSIA

The Malaysian Medical Relief Society, better known as MERCY Malaysia, is a medical relief organisation dedicated to providing humanitarian aid in crisis and non-crisis situation irrespective of race, religion, culture and boundary. Under the Royal Patronage of HRH Sultan Azlan Shah, the late Sultan of Perak Darul Ridzuan, MERCY Malaysia was incorporated on 16 September 1999 under the Registrar of Societies Malaysia.

The organisation focuses on several key areas namely health, water sanitation and hygiene (WASH) and disaster risk reduction.

MERCY Malaysia is a founding member and Secretariat of the Asian Disaster Reduction and Response Network (ADRRN). It is also a member of the International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA) and the Humanitarian Accountability Partnership (HAP). MERCY Malaysia subscribes to the Red Cross and Red Crescent (ICRC) International Code of Conduct for Humanitarian Organisations.

In November 2007, MERCY Malaysia became the third international organisation globally and the first Asian organisation to be certified for Act, MERCY Malaysia is supported by almost 500 members and approximately 7,000 registered volunteers.

WHO SHOULD JOIN:

A combination of individuals from governments (mid to senior management level), non-government organizations, programme procurement, logistics, finance, or IT department of Humanitarian Organisation, donors and academia who are involved either directly or indirectly in disaster management locally or internationally. A balanced combination from all sectors are needed to create a balance in understanding and appreciating roles and responsibilities of each actor in disaster management and to promote effective coordination between individuals of different backgrounds

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

1. To provide detailed picture of humanitarian system in emergency relief as well as long term development context (types of disasters, disaster life cycle, involved actors, various type of response)
2. To generate fundamental understanding of humanitarian logistics and supply chain management components in humanitarian operations
3. Teaching technical knowledge on relevant logistics aspects to be applied in practical exercise
4. To establish core team readily deployable for logistics activities from warehouse, transportation, assets movements, asset set up and exit plan
5. To test existing capabilities among participating countries and improve further

COURSE CONTENTS:

1. Part 1: Humanitarian Logistics Management
 - Introduction to Humanitarian Logistics & Supply Chain Management
 - Preparedness and Supply Chain Design
 - Lifecycle Management of the deployment (things have to be done differently at setup, middle and ramp down of deployment)
 - Stakeholder management (because humanitarian operations have so many people involved with so many different level of authority and interest)
2. Part 2: Simulation of distribution and movement in a complex environment with many stakeholders and interest
 - General overview of the air craft /lorry /structure
 - General overview on cargo compartment & limitation
 - Loading and lashing equipment
 - General overview on loading and movement procedures
