1. GUIDELINES FOR THE PREPARATION OF THE COUNTRY REPORT

Program participants are requested to prepare and submit their country report individually or as a group to the Hyundai Research Institute Program Manager via e-mail (rbs1202@hri.co.kr) no later than March 27, 2017.

Note. The KOICA's Fellowship Program includes a 'Country Report' session where participants have an opportunity to analyze Peru's current status and circumstances in the program subject and share it with other participants and Korean experts. It aims to provide appropriate solutions and insights to the identified problems and issues of their country.

The Country Report should be in MS PowerPoint or Word format. The length of the report should not exceed twenty A4-sized pages. The report should be written in English and double-spaced.

All participants are required to give a 15-minute presentation on their country report individually or as a group. For more effective presentations, a projector, slide projector, overhead projector, and multimedia TV will be available (PowerPoint presentations are preferred).

2. TOPICS TO BE COVERED IN THE COUNTRY REPORT

On the second day of the program, all participants will make an individual or group presentation titled "Country Report" following the guidelines below:

Based on what you have presented and discussed throughout the courses, you are requested to present an action plan on the last day of the workshop.

A. Programs to improve Peru's e-Government status

Possible subject 1: Provide a historical background and the present status of Peru's e-Government

Possible subject 2: What are some challenges that Peru is currently facing while introducing electronic Government?

Possible subject 3: Describe both the long and short term plan for Peru's Electronic Government

B. Details of Country Report Preparation

• Review of Peru's Electronic Government: History and Present Status

- Please briefly summarize the history of Peru's electronic Government: when it has started; how it has evolved.
- Please describe the current status of Peru's electronic Government. What kinds of electronic Government do you use? Please briefly summarize the electronic Government you are currently using and/or planning.

• Success and/or failure cases of Peru's electronic Government

- Please describe a success case of Peru's electronic Government. What were the key factors for its success?
- Please describe a failure case of Peru's electronic Government. Why do you think it has failed?

• Challenges and future direction of Peru's electronic Government

- Please mention and describe the tasks/challenges Peru is facing while implementing an electronic Government
- In your opinion, which direction should Peru take in terms of planning and implementing electronic Government?

Above all, the Country Report should also include issues that you feel should be addressed that would ultimately enhance the electronic Government of Peru. (Please refer to the program module for more ideas)

1. GUIDELINES FOR PREPARATION OF THE ACTION PLAN

All participants are required to prepare a presentation on their action plan individually or as a group at the end of the course. The action plan is to identify Peru's current problems of e-Government and propose appropriate solutions in order to solve these problems.

The participants are encouraged to make the most of their weekends and leisure time to further their knowledge acquired from the program and better prepare their presentation for the action plan.

4. SIGNIFICANCE OF THE ACTION PLAN

The action plan is to identify each country's current problems and propose appropriate solutions in order to solve these problems.

All participants should prepare a feasible Action Plan based lectures and practices on the methodology of analyzing statistical data on e-Government policy and e-Government data system. Also, they will be required to analyze statistical data strategically to prove feasibility of their Action Plan in detail.

Through the Action Plan, all participants will have an opportunity to review the current state of Peru's e-Government and issues to recognize their exact problems in the short term. In the long term, by sharing the Action Plan with colleagues, participants will be able to contribute to the economic development and social stability through planning Peru's e-Government development policies and developing executive capability.

To sum up, they could achieve their goals of 1) setting the basic direction for establishing the e-Government development strategies of their country and 2) operating human resources strategically.
