Singapore Cooperation Programme

Singapore has provided technical assistance to other developing countries since the 1960s. As a country whose only resource is its people, Singapore believes that human resource development is vital for economic and social progress. Singapore itself has benefited from training provided by other countries and international organisations.

In 1992, the Singapore Cooperation Programme (SCP) was established to bring together under one framework the various technical assistance programmes offered by Singapore. Through the SCP, the range and number of training programmes were increased to share Singapore's development experience with other developing countries.

To date, Singapore has sponsored training courses and study visits for over 114,000 officials from more than 170 countries. The SCP is managed by the Technical Cooperation Directorate of the Singapore Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction

The UN General Assembly adopted the International Strategy for Disaster Reduction in December 1999 and established UNISDR. UNISDR is the focal point in the UN system for the coordination of disaster risk reduction and the implementation of the international frameworks for disaster risk. Its core areas of work includes ensuring disaster risk reduction (DRR) is

applied to climate change adaptation, Increasing investments for DRR.

The UNISDR's Global Education and Training Institute (GETI), which was established in 2010, has a mandate to develop a new cadre of professionals in DRR and climate change adaptation for disaster resilient societies. To deliver on this mandate, it has focused primarily on national and city leaders and municipal disaster risk managers. Over the years UNISDR has trained over 4,500 government officials on various aspects of disaster risk reduction, from 73 countries.

Programme Objectives

This course shares Singapore's experiences in disaster risk reduction and the government approach in formulating adaptation measures and building resilience in the community. The focus would not be just on theory but also on institutional development and capacity building to implement plans. The course would also cover Singapore's policies and implementation systems in sustainable urban planning and development. It will also discuss the principles, strategies and policies in the latest master plan 2014 and the government's commitment, plans, targets and projects in the newly-released "Sustainable Singapore Blueprint 2015" and the government efforts in strengthening governance and building capacity.

Participants will also learn about the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030, 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and possible applications to their State's existing plans. UNISDR will provide globally accepted tools and help the participants become familiar with the tools, use them and develop draft action plans for integrating DRR and CCA into development policies. UNISDR will bring global best practices and encourage sharing of experiences amongst the participants as well. Conducted in collaboration with UNISDR, the course examines key principles of disaster risk reduction and the hardcoding of resilience into policy, infrastructure and human behaviour. It will share Singapore's approach to formulating adaptation measures to mitigate the risks of emergencies and build community resilience.

Synopsis

The programme will cover the following aspects:

- Vulnerability assessment through economic risk analysis, catastrophe assessment and finance management.
- Setting up early warning systems to avoid or reduce risks
- Building public health resilience through pandemic preparedness
- Formulating emergency management plans, evacuation planning & training and implementation.
- Essential and emergency operations.
- Working with public and private stakeholders and strengthening policy and decision-making processes
- Climate change adaptation and mitigation measures.
- Sustainable urban planning and development
- Strengthening governance and building capacity
- Integration of DRR and climate change adaptation to development policy. Key sectors covered will include infrastructure, housing, land use planning, environmental protection, to name a few

Methodology

Using the best mix of training and learning methodologies, this course will be highly interactive and experiential. Besides formal lecturing, activities include open discussions, group work, experiential activities and other learning methodologies. Participants will also have adequate opportunity to share their experiences, learning points and challenges during the programme. Relevant site visits will also be included. Shortlisted candidates may be requested to prepare in advance a country report related to disaster risk reduction and possible application of the UNISDR Post-2015 Framework to their State's existing plans, which will be presented at the course.

Duration

The programme will be held from **2 to 5 October 2017**.

Application Information

Applicants should be:

- Mid – to senior level government officials involved in disaster risk reduction policy making and/or national emergency planning and management, and can include officials from planning and finance/budget office;
- Nominated by their respective Governments;
- Proficient in written and spoken English; and
- In good health.

Terms of Award

The programme is sponsored by the Government of Singapore under the Singapore Cooperation Programme and the UNISDR.

Under this joint programme arrangement, the following expenses for the successful applicants (thereafter known as participants) during their training in Singapore, will be covered by the Singapore Cooperation Programme, which include:

- A daily training allowance of One Hundred and Twenty Singapore Dollars (S\$120) from first day to last day of the course to cover meals and daily expenses. [Complimentary breakfast is provided in the hotel from the first day to one day after the course];
- Transportation to course venue and site visits;
- Medical insurance for participants to cover accident and hospitalisation during their stay in Singapore in accordance with the policy of a local insurance company; and
- Accommodation for the entire duration of the course.

Note:

- (i) Airfares should be covered by the respective government institutions.
- (ii) Participants are to bear their personal miscellaneous expenses that might be incurred prior to receiving the allowance.
- (iii) Any expenses for out-patient medical/dental treatment will be borne by the participants themselves.

Regulations

Participants are required to comply with the following:

- (a) Strictly observe programme schedules and not miss training sessions.
- (b) Not bring any member of their family and/or aide for the duration of the course.
- (c) Carry out instructions and abide by conditions as may be stipulated by the nominating Government or the Government of Singapore with respect to the course.
- (d) Refrain from engaging in political activities, or any form of employment for profit or gain while in Singapore.
- (e) Discontinue the course, in the event they fall seriously ill and are considered unable to continue the training or have committed an improper act.
- (f) Return to their respective home countries upon completion of the course.

Application Procedure

(Closing date for nomination: **21 August 2017**)

The Government of Singapore is pleased to invite the respective National Focal Points for Technical Assistance to nominate **one (1)** suitable applicant.

Selection of applicants will be based on merit. Should there be more applicants than training places, the Government of Singapore and UNISDR seeks the understanding of the respective National Focal Points for Technical Assistance in the event that its nominee(s) is not selected.

All nominations are to be submitted by the respective Government Institutions, using the official application form. The application forms are to be submitted and should reach the **Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Singapore** through the National Focal Point and the Singapore Embassy in the nominating country, or via email to the email address listed below, no later than **Monday, 21 August 2017**.
