



ABOUT MTCP

The Malaysian Technical Cooperation Programme (MTCP) was officially launched on 7 September 1980 at the 2nd Commonwealth Heads of Government Regional Meeting (CHOGRM) in New Delhi, India, aims at providing technical assistance to participating countries. The programme consolidates various forms of technical cooperation in areas where Malaysia has the experience and the expertise.

Annually, MTCP collaborates with its leading Training Institutions to conduct capacity building programmes in various key areas of development. Since its inception in 1980, more than 34,415 participants from 144 recipient countries have benefited from the various programmes offered under MTCP.

OBJECTIVES OF MTCP

1. To share development experience with other countries
2. To strengthen bilateral relations between Malaysia and other developing countries
3. To promote South-South Cooperation (SSC)
4. To promote technical cooperation among developing countries (TCDC).

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. To understand the principles of humanitarian actions
2. To encourage coordinated approach to disaster response
3. To enhance capacity and efficiency of humanitarian workers
4. To develop and nurture the holistic concept of Total Disaster Risk Management (TDRM)
5. To familiarize participants to tools and cross-cutting issues in disaster response and disaster risk reduction.

WHO SHOULD JOIN

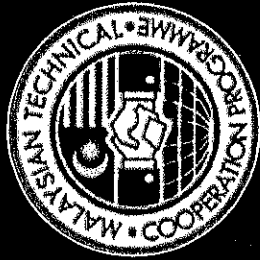

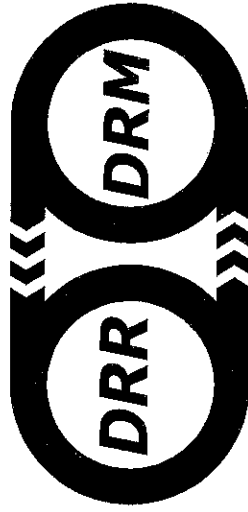

DISASTER RISK MANAGEMENT

Historically, dealing with disasters focused on emergency response, but towards the end of the 20th century it was increasingly recognised that disasters are not natural and that it is only by reducing and managing conditions of hazard, exposure and vulnerability that we can prevent losses and alleviate the impacts of disasters.

Reducing these three components of risk requires identifying and reducing the underlying drivers of risk, which are particularly related to poor economic and urban development choices and practice, degradation of the environment, poverty and inequality and climate change, which create and exacerbate conditions of hazard, exposure and vulnerability.

APPLICATIONS

MTCP application forms can also be obtained at nearest Malaysian Embassies in recipient countries.

All application forms must be duly completed and endorsed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs or National Focal/Aid Coordinator Agency in the respective countries (the relevant ministry or agency responsible for the overall coordination of international technical assistance) and should be submitted **ONLY** through the diplomatic channel via Embassy of Malaysia in the respective countries.

Submitted application forms must be accompanied by the applicant's:

- Copy of Passport (Every pages)
- Passport sized coloured photo (3.5cm x 5cm)
- Medical Report

Application closing date: 15 July 2020.

Only successful applicants will be notified.

VISA-WITH-REFERENCE

Visa and Vaccination It is mandatory for all the MTCP participants to follow the Visa With Reference (VWR) application procedure. Once the approval is obtained, the training institution should send a copy of VDR approval letter to the participants.

Subsequently, with the copy of the approval, the participants may get the VDR from the nearest Embassy of Malaysia. Wherever applicable, participants are advised to arrange for vaccination on their own prior to travel to Malaysia.

Expenditures on all visa-related fees, airport tax/airport user's charge, transit insurance, excess luggage, travel tax, transit fees, domestic passenger terminal fees, phone charges, private purchases, etc borne by the participants.

VACCINATION FOR YELLOW FEVER

Participants from some countries are required to take a mandatory vaccination for yellow fever at least 10 days prior to their departure to Malaysia.

Yellow Fever certificate is required to be produced upon landing in Malaysia for countries as listed at the link below:

AIRFARES

A return air ticket from the capital city of the recipient country to Kuala Lumpur on economy class is provided for participants. Please refer to the MTCP website for further details. Expenditures such as visa and transit fees, excess baggage fees are borne by the participants.

PRACTICAL NOTES

Language

English is the official working language for the 2019 MTCP Training Course on DRM. The official and national language of Malaysia is Bahasa Malaysia. English is widely spoken and understood in Malaysia.

Weather

Malaysia experiences tropical weather year-round. Temperatures range from 21°C (70°F) to 32°C (90°F). Higher elevations are much colder with temperatures between 15°C (59°F) to 25°C (77°F). Annual rainfall varies from 2,000mm to 2,500mm.

Currency

The monetary unit of the country in Ringgit Malaysia (RM) The exchange rate is valued at USD1 = RM4.07 (as of January 2020). Foreign currencies can be exchanged at banks and money changers found widely at the airport and city center. ATMs are available country-wide with 24-hour access. Major credit cards are widely accepted.

Per Diem

Each participants will be provided with RM85.00 per day.
